A MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL

here have been a few unusual years in Hunters Hill High School history but this one would have to be up there with the most unusual. 2020 was a year that started normally enough but soon became one that tested the resolve of our community. The good thing is, we came out stronger with many of our students developing their determination and confidence and our young staff developing their technology and delivery skills. It showed too, the positive relationship we have with our community, which was reflected in the fantastic levels of cooperation we received. At this time too, I need to acknowledge the great work that Ms Chiew-Meldrum who took the reins when I had an unexpected trip to hospital. Her calm diligence ensured the school continued to function as well as it could under the circumstances. I am sure we all wish her well on her sabbatical year next year.

Fortunately for us, we had some solid electronic delivery platforms that we were already using before remote learning, which made the transition to remote an easier task for us than many schools around the state. As a result, we were able to maintain progress through the courses, particularly for Year 12.

Despite the disruptive year, we have managed to stay on track with the school's long term goals. This year, we embraced the use of the 4Cs approach to learning. This approach looks at utilising creativity, collaboration, connectivity and critical thinking to keep pedagogy at a higher-order level. We were making good progress when we were hit with a hiatus due to ongoing restrictions. However, early indications are very positive. The first group of staff have almost completed their training and the second group is well under way. It will be an important step for us as we try to take advantage of the growth we have made in writing over the last two years. Whilst students are writing with better structure and more consistently, we are now aiming at getting higher-quality arguments as well.

Despite the unusual nature of the year, we were able to have some notable achievements. Well done to the Year 12 students who achieved their Gold Duke of Edinburgh Awards: they are the first in living memory! Sailing also returned to Hunters Hill High School. The school now has four training yachts and it has proved a popular sport option, as has the resilience building programme, Ready, Set, Sail, which we have developed within the school. My thanks to Mr Neild and Mr Law for leading the way. The TAS and PE departments have had amazing makeovers with the rebuilt girl-friendly gym and the NASA-like maker space taking us into state-of-the-art territory.

Well done to the P&C under new President Jacqueline Crompton who have supported the school in such a positive way. Thanks to the P&C too for their efforts in keeping the ensemble program going under adverse circumstances this year. I must give a special mention to Emma Paxton, P&C stalwart, who has taken it upon herself to write some community funding submissions so that we have shade sails near the oval and more student seating near the Lane Cove River.

A couple of staff movements have occurred that I need to recognise too. I thank Ms Simpson for all the things she has done for the school in her time here as she heads off to motherhood fulltime. Mrs Michelle Donovan commenced her role as Deputy Principal this year, joining us from Jamison High School. Whilst Mrs Donovan has already made her presence felt in a variety of ways, her appointment reflects our growing numbers, which have now qualified us for a second Deputy Principal for the first time in some years. These growing numbers have also allowed us to appoint an additional Head Teacher. To this end, the very popular Mr Kenji Luk has been appointed as Head Teacher Administration, effective from the start of the new year.

It was a full year, and another year in which we took steps forward together with our community. I have only provided a snapshot here of what transpired during 2020. I urge you to explore the rest of the Moocooboola to see all the other interesting things like Art, Debating and the Musical.

P&C REPORT



he P&C managed to undertake a big year of reform in 2020, despite it also being a year of serious upheaval as a result of the global pandemic. Our ability to simultaneously create positive change and demonstrate resilience in the face of changes imposed on us speaks to the strength of our school community.

Reforms in the way the P&C operates its core functions have been widespread and significant, and we hope they will result in lasting benefits for the school community for years to come. In 2020, the P&C changed financial management systems to Xero, making our accounting accurate and our financial position much more transparent. We also engaged new service suppliers: a new bookkeeper (a

chartered accountant and HHHS alumni), as well as a new auditor, to provide modern, professional services to the P&C. Our financial reporting and our financial position has never been better.

These measures, while they may seem boring or bureaucratic in nature, mean that the P&C can deliver exciting opportunities for our students, because we have certainty of the funds we can invest in facilities for the school, and because the core business of the P&C is running smoothly. This enables the Executive and participating parents to focus on what matters: creating possibilities for our children and the school.

In 2020, we proudly invested almost \$170,000 in new facilities at Hunters Hill High School, including a \$55,000

contribution towards an \$82,000 refit of the fitness centre; which has created the best gym and fitness facility of any public school in NSW. The P&C continued its investment in TAS technologies, purchasing a second laser cutter and a CNC milling machine for \$77,000, and committed \$28,000 to performing arts, including a new digital piano and upgraded lighting and staging in the Hall, which will enable Entertainment HSC courses to be offered at HHHS.

Finally, we were pleased to receive a funding proposal from the Student Representative Council for an \$8,000 new bike rack accommodating 40 bikes, thereby promoting fitness and independence in our students.

The reforms undertaken by the P&C in 2020 did not come out of the blue. They

built on earlier reforms undertaken by previous P&C Executives. One key reform has been the management our uniform shop, which has resulted in a reduced stock liability of more than \$70,000, and allowed the school community to review the current uniform in 2020.A Uniform Review is never a small or a simple undertaking, and it was long overdue at HHHS. The P&C is proud to have conducted a genuinely consultative process that has delivered changes to our uniform that truly reflect the school community's views and offer improved choice, improved comfort, modernity and an overall improved appearance in our student body. Importantly, gender neutral items have been properly included. Our students are wearing their uniforms well, and we look forward to seeing new items being introduced throughout 2021.



In 2020, we farewelled our long-standing Canteen Manager of 16years, Bronwyn Clark, who resigned to commence her retirement after an incredible run of service and commitment to HHHS. The P&C warmly thanks Bronwyn for her dedication to our school community and we wish her well in her retirement.

Whenever you have a new manager, there's always an exciting opportunity to put new ideas and approaches into action, and our new Canteen Manager, Anna Stevis, has been given a mandate by the P&C to refresh the canteen service. The changes in canteen offerings, introduced in late 2020, especially the provision of freshly-cooked meals, have been extremely popular with staff and students, and very profitable for the P&C. We expect the canteen to build on that wonderful new beginning in 2021, and we look forward to the canteen providing the P&C with a steady and significant stream

of funds that can be invested back into the school year on year.

Unfortunately, 2020 was not a great year for our extracurricular activities, with performing arts opportunities vastly inhibited by the impact of the pandemic. There was no Variety Night, no eisteddfods, no public performances in front of live audiences for our dance troupes, music ensembles, and stage performers. However, our Coordinators, Jenny Nyland, Jess Kimber and Dianna Rich worked brilliantly with the Creative & Performing Arts Department Head, Jenny Sibley, to create two fantastic programs that were recoerded and distributed to the school community.

While this was a wonderful example of the parents and teachers thinking outside the square, nothing beats a live audience, and we hope our students have an opportunity to shine on stage in the near future. The P&C is grateful to students, parents, our





tutors and coordinators for hanging in there and keeping these troupes and ensembles going despite the lack of production opportunities. There is a lot of passion in the school community for the performing arts, and we hope to see that continue going forward.

The year ended on a high with the third Annual Colour Run and the Year 12 Formal, which was postponed from their usual dates in Term 3 to late November, in keeping with COVID-safety restrictions. It was a wonderful achievement to be able to safely stage these events in the school grounds in spite of the pandemic. The Colour Run and the Year 12 Formal were both displays of amazing school spirit and resilience, and they offered opportunities for the fun and connectivity that our children really deserved after a long and disrupted year of so many sacrifices.



During the remote learning period, the English faculty engaged students in creative writing topics such as Speculative Fiction, Crime Fiction and a Creative Writing portfolio. This was a





MATHEMATICS



he Mathematics faculty has continued to grow this year and, while 2020 has brought with it a number of challenges, it has also taught us new skills and practices. We welcomed a few new staff: Mr Luke Baczynskyj and Mr Anup Bajgai as new permanent staff in Term One, and Ms Marlen Ghalloub, who accepted a permanent position in Term 4. I would also like to thank Mr Michael Johnston for his commitment to the Mathematics faculty this year.

Our commitment to incorporating 4Cs pedagogies into our Mathematics teaching has been a challenging, but enjoyable, journey. We have found that students are beginning to share their observations and their thinking in the Mathematics

classroom more readily: they are finding their voice and taking more agency in their learning. They are also beginning to see that there are many similarities in their peer's experiences in learning Maths. I personally saw this growth in our Year 12 students, who worked consistently to develop a stronger reflective practice, coming into their own as successful learners, on their approach to their HSC examinations.

The implementation of 4Cs and our growing faculty called for some changes in rooming, and the Mathematics faculty was lucky to receive a new learning space. The modular desks mean that the room can be arranged to accommodate small and large groups. The room also has whiteboards lining each of the walls, which has allowed

students to make their thinking more visible, prompting easy peer assessment and deeper conversations about effective and appropriate practices. We're hopeful we can implement other such upgrades next year and maximise the use of these resources throughout the faculty.

During Term One, as the COVID situation escalated and we were faced with the possibility of remote learning, we made a commitment to provide all students with access to MathsOnline, entirely funded by Hunters Hill High School. While this online resource was used regularly by teachers throughout the year to provide learning activities for students, it really shone when students took initiative in their learning and used MathsOnline as an effective part of their reflective practice: practise, assess, reflect, and repeat. Students were able to access content from their current year as well as previous years, with video explanations, questions to practise and diagnostic activities.

The Numeracy Centre has continued to be a mainstay for the Mathematics faculty into 2020. The Numeracy Centre works on an opt-in basis; students are encouraged to attend, and can choose when, depending on their needs. Primarily used for students to receive support with their learning, students also use the time to complete outstanding homework and assessments. It was particularly helpful for students seeking to remedy the challenges experienced with remote learning earlier this year. I am grateful to the staff who continue to volunteer their own lunch times to further support student learning and engagement. In 2021, the Numeracy Centre will continue to operate during

lunch times every day but Tuesday.

Unfortunately, our annual World of Maths Roadshow excursion for Year 7 students had to be postponed this year. We hope to invite them back to Hunters Hill High School in 2021 to provide both Year 7 and 8 students an opportunity to apply Mathematics to practical and real-life situations through a number of challenging Mathematical puzzles.

However, we were still able to participate in the APSMO Intra-school Mathematics Olympiad this year, with over 60 students from Year 7 and 8 taking part. The Mathematics Olympiad is a contest for students to show off their problem solving skills. Students demonstrated their capacity through a series of five contests (each consisting of five challenging questions) over the course of the year. Congratulations to the Years 7 and 8 students who achieved the highest scores and demonstrated a commendable enthusiasm in this year's Intra-school Mathematics Olympiad.

This year saw the completion of the first HSC examinations for the new Mathematics Advanced and Extension courses, although this was the second year for the Mathematics Standard 2 course. The new courses have proven to be interesting, with challenging, but engaging content. The HSC exams had some really stimulating questions as common content for the Standard and Advanced courses; you may have heard about the crickets!

We continued to engage our students with interesting and dynamic Mathematical investigations in Stage 6. Year 12 Extension 1 students investigated Proof by Mathematical Induction, looking closely into the practice of peer assessment and

feedback. They also investigated false proofs, those that satisfy the requirements of Mathematical Induction, but have weak assumptions or poor transitions between the base and inductive cases. Ask them to prove that everybody has the same name! Extension 2 students designed an aerobatic display involving multiple aircraft using vectors to represent motion and stunts, like having two planes fly through the same plume of fire! In Year 12 Mathematics Advanced, students assessed the validity of Wisdom of the Crowds, which is the idea that the collective opinion of a group of individuals is more accurate than that of a single expert. This statistical investigation had them create a test to evaluate this idea, which then required surveying and data collection skills, as well as challenging students to demonstrate their capacity to analyse that data to argue a conclusion.

Those in Year 11 Advanced maintained a learning journal throughout the topic of Introduction of Differential Calculus, which helped to develop the strong reflective practices that will see them be successful in their HSC preparation. Students studying Mathematics Standard 2 investigated the Mathematics of laying a network of submarine cables between a number of cities, determining the most efficient and cost-effective path.

We look forward to an engaging year in Mathematics in 2021.



SCIENCE

his year has been a challenging time for everyone, but also a fantastic learning experience. During the year, both staff and students were challenged to build their resilience and ability to work independently. I would like to thank the whole Science faculty for their incredibly hard work throughout the year, especially with all the extra challenges presented by the pandemic.

The HSC students of 2020 stepped up to the challenges of the year and the demands of their courses. In Biology, students built on their ability to analyse and evaluate research when they learned about the impact of a genetic disorder and how it can be diagnosed, treated, or managed now or in the future. In Physics, students made models to explain electromagnetism. Some built models of motors, wireless phone chargers and more. Chemistry students had to meet a challenge of working chemists: they needed to perform an experiment and calculations to work out what was in an unknown solution. This took precision, skill, and concentration to determine the components. Finally, in Investigating





Science, students looked at the way media and marketing try to manipulate us and how we can avoid falling for their tricks.

The extra challenges of this year forced a few changes to our plan for Years 7 to 10 assessment tasks, but we will continue to reflect on and improve our portfolios of work. We are very proud of the way many students are continuing to show their thinking and learning in the classroom and their ability to reflect on their understanding. We too will continue to reflect on our own teaching and learning to build everyone's ability to demonstrate creativity, critical reflection, collaboration, and communication.

As part of our revitalisation of Year 9, students were given the opportunity to experiment with a variety of different renewable energy sources this year. Students investigated wind turbines and

solar panels to determine what makes them most efficient. They tried to answer questions, including how many blades should a wind turbine have and what size should they be? How do wind turbines affect bird populations? Do solar panels work best when connected by series or parallel circuits? Students performed a variety of experiments to answer these questions. We will be continuing to build on Years 7 to 10 topics next year.

The introduction of the 4Cs learning approach has led to some fantastic learning experiences throughout the school year. Students have debated the ethics of organ transplantation and classes have spent time reflecting on their learning. For example, Year 12 Biology recently build models of cell replication processes and reflected on their learning using mini whiteboards.

The Science faculty also continued to utilise the ALARM framework to support students' writing and ability to engage in higher-order thinking. This has assisted with their writing and thinking skills both in the context of Science, and in other subject areas. We are continuing to build student capacity for deep understanding this year and next by working with others in the school on the 4Cs learning approach. We are excited to provide students with more opportunities to develop their communication, collaboration, creativity and critical reflection using this approach.


During Semester Two, Years 8 and Year 10 students undertook the Validation of Assessment 4 Learning and Individual Development (VALID) tests. This program provides an online assessment for Science. VALID assists the school to monitor students' achievement and will continue to inform our teaching and learning practices for the future.

Unfortunately, this year we couldn't invite primary students for Hands on Science, but we look forward to bringing the program back in the future. Top of the Hill was able to go ahead and students had a great time learning about Science in high school. We look forward to welcoming more students next year.

2020 has been a productive year for Science, and we look forward to next year as the school continues to grow.

HUMAN SOCIETY & ITS ENVIRONMENT (HSIE)



he year has seen many challenges, but students and teachers have made the most of these difficulties to thrive and test themselves under adverse conditions. The HSIE faculty staff remained largely unchanged from 2019, but saw the addition of Mr Alex Anicic who has joined the team to teach junior HSIE subjects and Modern History. In addition, Mr Luk was appointed as the permanent Head Teacher of Administration, confirming his position as a valuable and experienced teacher in the areas of Commerce and Business Studies.

While in lockdown, HSIE staff endeavoured to provide students with the best possible resources to keep them engaged through home learning. We saw the introduction of Zoom as a regular classroom feature and both students and staff had to display resilience in working in unfamiliar settings.

We were excited as a staff body to see our students return during Term 2, where our focus shifted to the traditional classroom and providing students with a range of pedagogical practices. HSIE staff have embraced the 4Cs approach to learning as led by Ms Razko, one of the school's teacher mentors. As a faculty, we have embraced the opportunity to engage our students to be active learners and undertake critical lifelong learning skills and practices.

The HSIE faculty sought to engage our students with extracurricular activities where possible, given the restrictions through the year on excursions. The Year 7 teachers aimed to integrate further primary research into their programs by allowing our students to undertake water testing to make findings about the quality of the water in the Lane Cove River. Other Geography classes have run online research activities to source primary and secondary data to facilitate student understanding of a range of geographical and historical issues. With the introduction of Stage 6 Aboriginal Studies and Economics in 2019, we have had our students reach completion of new courses that have been recently introduced. We look forward to running these courses again in the future.

The HSIE staff continued to assist students in their roles as wellbeing mentors. Mrs Pena has continued to play a significant role in her capacity as a Creating Chances mentor and Year 7 Year Advisor, while Mr McAlpine has played a highly significant role as Year 12 Year Advisor, helping the group navigate through an extremely difficult final year of schooling. Furthermore, Mr Skinner has continued in his role as Relieving HSIE Head Teacher one day a week, while also fulfilling the role as the new Year 10 Year Advisor. In addition to the UMatter program introduced by the school, the HSIE faculty continues to recognise the importance of our students' physical and mental wellbeing.

Throughout the school year, our longstanding teachers such as Mr Barclay, Ms Aniello, Ms Gerofi and Ms Apostolou used their experience in their capacity as HSC teachers to provide invaluable insights and guidance to Year 12. This assisted our Year 12s to be as prepared as possible for their final examinations. The faculty was lucky to have so many experienced HSC markers as well as teachers newly

appointed to this position in 2019 and 2020, which ultimately provides greater insight for our students on the finer points of being thoroughly prepared for the most significant examinations of their life. The broad diversity of subjects offered by the HSIE faculty has provided a vast array of opportunities for our student body.

The year certainly presented hurdles across the entire school, but also provided us with the opportunity for new initiatives and subjects to be offered. In 2021, the HSIE faculty is excited to offer further opportunities for our senior students with the introduction of both Business Services and Geography in Stage 6. This is a testament to the passion the teachers show for their respective humanities subjects and the response from students who have embraced the opportunities to be engaged with many contemporary issues that affect the modern world. In what will be an exciting year ahead, the ability to engage with more real-world experiences, including undertaking primary research and work placements will provide students with fundamental skills that they will require as they progress through their school lives.

So, while 2020 presented its hurdles, the faculty embraced these difficulties with diligence and we are grateful to our student body, their families and the wider community for supporting us through the complexities of the year.

Visual Arts capitalised on the audience of the Year 7 information night for our first event and hosted a whole school Art Exhibition where every Year 7 student's self-portrait was on display and became part of a lucky dip draw. Art work from all grades was exhibited along with individual projects created outside of the classroom. The Year 12 music class performed a gutsy version of "Don't Stop Me Now" from Queen along with a selection of works

from their individual HSC programs. Additionally, the TAS faculty indulged us all with canapés and fresh fruit as we all enjoyed the conversations with new families and students.

By Week Six, we were emptying music classrooms into corridors and the Theatrette in preparation for the painters. This was no mean feat as each room has a collection of instruments, computers, amps and books as well as desks, chairs, pianos, drum kits and cupboards to support three concurrent classes. The music staff and many of our students pitched in moving item by item with the

GA team doing the heavy lifting. For the next two weeks, we were all scattered throughout the school amidst all of the growing concerns of the virus. Then suddenly, we were in lockdown.

The painters completed the task just in time and the clean white walls now look bright and fabulous and what seemed at first to be the worst timing for painting turned out to be the best. With the support once again of the GA team and a handful of students, the task of rebuilding the classrooms without interrupting any classes took place over the first three weeks of Term Two. Our keyboard lab was extended into the storeroom next door and can now seat around 26 students comfortably with improved access for staff. Ukulele hanging racks were constructed and worn out whiteboards were replaced. The music rooms not only look fantastic, but are highly functional for all of our classes. This all took a small army of support from staff and students and we're truly grateful.

As we transitioned to remote learning, Miss Colligan created a fun online message from the staff to students including messages from the Principal and teachers, some silly study techniques and a song. We all needed a good laugh and the staff sure enjoyed it. Miss Tombs and Miss Colligan had to think of new ways of creating performance opportunities and the online Soiree was one of their brilliant ideas. Normally, this September event would have an audience of family and friends of the ensemble members for a night of performance in the hall. This year, the performance was professionally filmed, edited and uploaded on the school's web

site. The performers had to be each other's audience and they were outstanding in supporting and encouraging each other. We were all very proud of the kids.

Our HSC students in Drama, Music and Visual Arts were resilient in their preparation for performances and major works and never complained about the circumstances of this year. We've enjoyed some great news which you'll read about in the following articles. It has been a joy seeing each of these young people develop their skills and character through all types of challenges.

Customarily, Year 12 teachers host a showcase of student work in August, where parents and the community are invited to view, watch and listen to HSC major works. Visual Arts teacher Ms Scenna created a School Showcase event in Week One of Term 4 where the student population had the opportunity to be inspired by the creative talent of our seniors. It was a great success and another example of staff ensuring that all of our school continued to flourish this year.



Ms Wong has ensured that our student VA works were entered into the Young In Art competition held at Hunters Hill Council and our students secured a staggering 10 of the 14 prizes. Among these works were a variety of sculpture, photography, paintings and group work.

As we continue to cater for 21st-century learners, the Music staff have created a sound recording studio in B Block and are working with professionals in the field of editing. PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT, HEALTH & PHYSICAL EDUCATION (PDHPE)



fter a year of personnel changes in 2019, 2020 brought an air of stability to the PDHPE Faculty, with Mr Smith, Mr Habbouchi, Ms Wilson, Mr Neild, Mrs Mazzitelli and Mr Bastian on deck for what was to be a year like no other! Little did we know it when we turned up for work in January...

After laying some ground work at the end of last year, Years 7 to 10 were faced with a

completely renovated curriculum for 2020. Underpinned by the new NESA PDHPE syllabus, and using the whole school pedagogical approaches of 4Cs and ALARM, students were treated to a vastly different learning experience. Records of learning went 100% electronic, with the majority of students working from their personal electronic devices and others utilising the hardworking faculty set of Chromebooks

to complete their in-class learning tasks. There was also an explosion of small group and whole-class collaborative tasks to develop students' critical and creative thinking in PDHPE.

To enable this, the PDHPE faculty became the first faculty at HHHS to use the Microsoft Teams interface as a learning portal. This was used by all classes from Years 7-10 for PDHPE, as well as Year 9 and 10 PASS and Year 11 PDHPE. While Teams has similar features to Google Classroom, its synchronisation with Microsoft OneNote allowed staff greater structuring capability, as well as a more fluid experience checking student work. This move proved to be an absolute lifesaver once the remote learning period commenced, as teachers were able to effectively "push" all learning experiences to students electronically, as well as host virtual class meetings from within the Teams interface.

2020, also saw a record engagement with mandatory assessment tasks, with more students than ever across Years 7-10 submitting their assessment tasks on time. Furthermore, teachers received record requests from students for feedback on drafts of assessments, which led to a steady improvement in results.

Mr Neild and Mr Habbouchi led the charge with the launch of the new PASS units of work, which saw students exposed to new and exciting sports such as Fist Ball and Spike Ball. These proved to be immensely popular with the students. They also ran the inaugural PASS Decathlon Championship, a fantastic one-day event for our two Year 9 PASS classes, which saw plenty of fantastic competition, as well as consumption of student-sourced sports nutrition options to power their performances. 9PASS also combined well with 10PASS to deliver the highly successful Year 7 Gala Day, which was coordinated by Ms Wilson to run for





our students at school as a COVID-pivoted event after Zone Gala Day was cancelled.

Another COVID-pivot was in response to the cancellation of the Athletics and Cross Country Carnivals. Students competed within their PDHPE classes in the COVID-19 Championships, participating in Cross Country, 100m, Shot Put, Discus and Javelin. Gold, Silver and Bronze Awards were bestowed upon each class for Boys and Girls Divisions in each event, before electronic tallying of combined results allowed for the determination of both class and year group champions. While our students thoroughly enjoyed this experience, they are looking forward to getting back to the real thing in 2021!

Mr Habbouchi, Ms Wilson and Mr Smith also worked tirelessly with their Year 12 classes to ensure that the remote learning lockdown period did not jeopardise their chances of HSC completion. This resulted in a record number of holiday sessions and practice trial exams being administered to our HSC PDHPE and CAFS classes to put them in best position to succeed.

Finally, the faculty would like to thank Mr Bastian for his dedicated service to the PDHPE faculty and to the role of Sports Organiser throughout 2019 and 2020. He has done a wonderful job with classes and more importantly, he has delivered a quality school sports program that has delivered many positive experiences for our students. Mr Bastian will remain HHHS for 2021 and will be leading up other whole-school initiatives, as well as teaching with HSIE Faculty. We thank him for his professionalism and we look forward to welcoming Ms Reynolds as our new PDHPE Teacher and Sports Organiser in 2021.

TECHNOLOGY & APPLIED SCIENCES (TAS)

would like to thank the entire TAS Faculty for an outstanding year. It has been a productive year with many students reaching heights they may have thought not possible at the commencement of 2020.

With an interrupted start to the year and home-schooling being part of semester one, I would also like to congratulate and thank the students and parents for embracing the time and supporting one another so that the work for TAS department set was completed.

Year 7 Technology Mandatory produced some outstanding marble mazes. With Ms Hunt adjusting the design and coding elements, the new and improved version has been a hit with students. Ms Herlihy Went is to be thanked for her efforts in the Agriculture unit, as Hunters Hill High School is one of only a select few schools in the state that has been allocated an IFarm; this is a federal initative to enable school students to study and gather data on the impacts of various agriculture processes.

In 2020, the Technology Department was lucky to have Ms Helena Dowdall join the faculty. Ms Dowdall came to Hunters Hill with a love for teaching. Her textile classes produced a Monster Toy and supporting portfolio of the highest standard.

Under the guidance of Ms Hunt, the Year 9 Design and Technology class produced an architectural project in the form of a teenager retreat, while in Semester















Two, students learned about cultural and historical design styles. Drawing upon this, they then developed a graphic print for a cushion cover. Year 10 Design and Technology created a "one plank project" which saw students develop skills in Google SketchUp, and then take their designs to produce a product out of a single piece of wood, 1200 x 290 mm. The work produced was outstanding.

With the guidance of Ms Dowdall, Year 9
Food Technology studied the units of Food
Equity and Food for Specific Needs. In
Food Equity, the students were exposed
to the inequity of food access on a global
scale. Students investigated local networks
and organisations before designing
a menu using surplus food from the
kitchen that would support their chosen
organisation.

Food in Australia and Food for Special Occasions were our two Year 10 units. Students cooked with bush spices and developed an Australia-themed biscuit while investigating migration and the influence immigration has had on Australian foods. In Food for Special Occasions, students investigated reasons for celebration. This resulted in producing delicious foods for Bastille Day and Remembrance Day.

Under the watchful eye of Ms Herlihy Went, Year 9 Industrial Technology Timber developed many new workshop skills. While making a wall cabinet, students learnt about widening joins, rebate and mitre joints and how to produce them using the domino and biscuit joiner. In Year 10 Timber, the class produced a bedside cabinet, again developing further skills in the use of the plunger router and developing more complex joints.

Our VET classes this year again were exceptional in their approach to industry needs and standards. The Year 12 Construction class again was outstanding with the laying of concrete around a picnic bench on the Oval, while the Year 11 Construction class put together the P&C-funded shade seating and laid the concrete

pads to support the seating.

Hospitality had a tough year with limited work experience dates and service periods due to COVID. Ms Karac did an exceptional job in organising and having student prepare sandwich delivery day for staff and the service of meals for the school formal.

Finally, the Year 12 Design and Technology class have surpassed all expectations and challenges that this year brought and have produced an exceptional range of innovative and creative major projects. The scope of projects ranged from sustainable eatable cutlery to prefabricated modular classrooms to a full technology integrated bedside table. Students drew from previous design projects to develop their major projects. The class worked tirelessly over the year to ensure they produced projects that they are genuinely passionate about, and that demonstrate how good design can improve our lives.

Once again, I would like to thank the TAS staff for another outstanding year. To all the graduating Year 12s, thank you for making the past six years fun and exciting and all the best with your future pursuits.

CHINESE & LITERATURE

uring 2020, Hunters Hill High School offered Chinese and Literature course for background speakers in Year 11 and Year 12. Students in both year groups actively participated in a wide range of critical thinking and collaborative activities. A Chinese Literature class library was also established and continued to expand to facilitate students' quality reading and writing skills.

Due to COVID-19, and the mandatory quarantine requirement, both Year 11 and Year 12 Chinese and Literature students were the first to experience remote learning after returning back from China at the end of January.

It takes strong self-discipline and intrinsic motivation for Year 11 students to start a brand-new course without even being in the classroom. Students actively participated in Adobe Connect lessons and posed questions to teachers regularly. They also completed group works remotely with their peers using Zoom calls, Facetime and a variety of digital tools to enhance communication. Through critically reviewing and analysing prescribed contemporary issues in this course, Year 11 students learned to research, conduct survey questionnaires and draw conclusions for the topic Young People's Pressures. In Semester Two, they held a mock election to compare and contrast educational issues between Chinese and Australian cultures. Moreover, they have also presented TEDTalk speeches reflecting the connection between overseas Chinese and their homeland.

In the Year 12 Chinese and Literature class,

students have analysed and evaluated a wide range of texts related to the contemporary issues such as changing of gender roles. They actively participated in class discussions, debates and mock interviews. Students also showed great enthusiasm when producing a collaborative music video to show their understandings of the text. A karaoke party was organised to deepen their understanding of the prescribed songs for topics Youth Culture and Perspectives on Identity.

It has been a memorable and innovative experience for our senior Chinese and Literature students at Hunters Hill High School this year.

INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS



020 has been a challenging but memorable year for our international students due to COVID-19.

When all students returned to school at the end of January, the majority of our international students were in 14 days self-isolation after visiting relatives in China. Through active communication and a strong rapport between students and staff, our international students were feeling united and supported throughout this difficult time away from their families. They were also the first group of students at Hunters Hill High School to engage in the remote learning experience and were actively engaged in all subjects.

During Term One, a group of outstanding international student representatives were invited to attend the 2020 NSW Government Schools International Student Awards ceremony at 5the ydney Conservatorium of Music with International Student Coordinator, Ms Guo. Two of our former

international students were shortlisted nominees: Baiyang Hu and Albert Yang. Our representatives were inspired and motivated by their fellow international students' stories across NSW.

At Open Day, volunteer senior international students promoted the Chinese course and Chinese culture with a great enthusiasm. They planned a variety of interactive cultural activities (such as table tennis and paper cutting) and showcased traditional Han Dynasty costumes for guests. They demonstrated great pride in our school and their culture through their positive actions.

This year, the P&C teamed up with the Student Representative Council and the International Student cohort to organise our annual Colour Fun Run on the 20th November. Our international student cohort held lunchtime meetings and worked closely with SRC Coordinator Ms Austin and Ms Guo to ensure that the event ran smoothly.

This year, Hunters Hill High School officially started to utilise popular social media WeChat to communicate with parents in China to further support students and parents. Our native Chinese speaker, International Student Coordinator, Ms Guo, communicated with parents during isolation to provide

useful information about school and their children. We have received a great deal of positive feedback that this communication channel has allowed parents to gain a deeper understanding of their children's lives in Australia.

CAREERS



t was a busy year in Careers in 2020.

There were some clear disruptions to our Year 12 students, but they handled the changing conditions with confidence and ease.

We saw a record number of students receiving early entry opportunities for university with over 40 students receiving offers. This made students' goal setting clearer, and ensured they had a focus for their future beyond 2020. It was a wonderful way to recognise their efforts in leadership, academia and extracurricular areas throughout their high school careers.

Year 12 students were interviewed in order to assist and educate in the planning of their transition into continued study or the workplace. Additionally, during Careers classes, each Year 10 student was guided with their selections for subjects heading into Years 11 and 12. This was a highly valuable way to ensure students were working towards a path that will benefit them in the future.

We have provided students from Years

9 to 12 the opportunity to study at TAFE in conjunction with their regular study at school. This has allowed students to experience learning in areas outside the normal school curriculum. Years 11 and 12 students were able to complete one of their HSC subjects in a vocational area of interest on Tuesday afternoons while Year 9 and 10 were able to enrol on specific vocational projects as a part of the YES program that is run through TAFE. This has allowed students to learn a range of skills and responsibilities for one day a week throughout a term.

It has been a busy, complicated and exciting year for Careers in 2020. Now more than ever, students are encouraged to seek guidance and support in navigating our ever-changing environment. We look forward to another innovative and constructive year in 2021, with more even more opportunities available to students as the world opens back up.

LEARNING & SUPPORT

020 was a challenge for the Learning and Support Team here at Hunters Hill High School, as it was across all schools. Our role evolved to respond to the increased diversity of learning needs derived from the need to move to remote learning.

With the introduction of the Wellbeing Coordinator in 2018, the Learning and Support Team has aimed to align the support resources to strengthen and complement one another.

Under the guidance of the Head Teacher Teaching, the Learning and Support Teachers, SLSOs (School Learning Support Officers) and Careers Advisors coordinated to address the additional challenges to our students' learning in an effective and personalised way.

In 2020, the team:

- Reviewed and refined processes around the application for Disability Provisions for students in Stage 4 and 5.
- Reviewed our policies to ensure we were responsive to the Inclusive Education Statement for Students with Disability.
- Established online learning platforms for students with integration funding and other students identified as requiring additional support during online learning, including Zoom sessions and Google Classrooms.
- Transitioned students into online learning with direct connections and

consultations with families.

- Ensured equity of access to learning through provision of technology and resources to families during lockdown.
- Successfully applied for Integration Funding and specialised settings.
- Developed tailored schedules for students during lockdown/
- Provided additional one-to-one support through scheduled class withdrawal for students where appropriate.
- Collaborated with faculties on programs, assessments and exams.
- Facilitated additional support programs when face to face teaching was permitted (Senior Study Group, Beyond the Bell, Eat Your Words and The Living Room).
- Established a targeted and regular study sessions for Year 9 after identifying this particular area of need, which was also identified by CESE.

WELLBEING



his was certainly a challenging year in more ways than one.
Our learning community had to demonstrate resilience and flexibility as our daily lives changed more frequently than we care to remember.
Despite these challenges, our students continued to demonstrate positive values and a commitment to their learning.
Wellbeing initiatives for 2020 included:

UMATTER

UMatter aims to develop Collaboration, Creativity, Communication and Critical Thinking skills; all necessary for success in the 21st Century. We continued to strengthen our UMatter Wellbeing program in 2020. Students rotated through UMatter sessions and Year Meetings where they participated in activities aimed at destigmatising mental health, strengthening their capacity to cope with diverse challenges, resolve issues respectfully and developing a stronger learning community. The lessons were practical, tangible and accompanied by an opportunity to reflect on their learning. By encouraging our students to be reflective and accountable, we are developing a school-wide culture of tolerance, kindness and empathy.

Our students are expected to contribute to their own wellbeing, the wellbeing of their peers and the collective wellbeing of their communities. In this way our school, in partnership with parents and carers, will equip our students to be active and positive contributors to their society.

PEER SUPPORT

During UMatter sessions, Year 11 Peer Support Mentors facilitated discussions with their Year 7 peers. Developing these strong connections, and using Year 11 as positive roles models, was incredibly rewarding for all involved.

BACKFLIPS AGAINST BULLYING

Students from Years 7 and 8 attended a performance from Backflips Against Bullying, a troupe who utilised incredible acrobatic and parkour skills to highlight important issues such as peer harassment and its consequences in the real world. The performance troupe expanded upon topics such as Cyberbullying, Resilience & Power Dynamics, Harassment vs Assault, Real World Consequences, and Targeted/Repeated Harassment.

Despite the heavy themes, the show was presented as a hilarious, fun and interactive experience. It featured awe-inspiring tricks and flips amongst interactive acrobatic scenes that depict the different examples of peer harassment. They provided exit strategies for victims of harassment and empowered bystanders to take action against victimisation.

POLICE LIAISON VISIT

We hosted our local Police Liaison Officer to present to Years 8 and 9 regarding cyber safety. The focus of the presentation was to promote behavioural change in regards to technology use. Top tips included:

- Be cautious about accepting friend or follower requests on social media.
- Never agree to meet someone you have met online alone.
- Learn how to block and report. The e-safety commission website has some great resources.

- Know how to get help on the social media websites and apps you use
- Ensure security at all times. Check that all profiles and accounts are set to private and that the camera on your phone isn't automatically turned on when using certain apps

RUOK DAY

To recognise RUOK Day, and to continue having open discussions about mental health, our students wore a touch of yellow. We also encouraged our students to follow the steps to start an RUOK conversation:

- 1. Ask R U OK?
- 2. Listen
- 3. Encourage action
- 4. Check in

World Teachers' Day was celebrated on Friday 30 October. This year, despite major challenges, teachers have made sure education continues across the country. It's reinforced the significant role they play in the lives of children and students, their families and communities.
