From The Principal

It's with a sense of disquiet as well as expectation that I realise our school year is drawing to a close. Over recent weeks significant moments in the school calendar have been negotiated: the HSC examinations have concluded and Year 12 Formal celebrated; our junior students have completed their assessments and teachers are immersed in marking, providing feedback to students and completing reports; Year 10 students are negotiating their final exams and our transition programs continue to great acclaim. Having said this, 'Dates to Remember' informs us of the significant events that are ahead this term and for which planning is well underway.

Whilst the term commenced with the very successful Primary Band Workshop, the inaugural parent forum '**Stepping Stones**' was a great success. Attended by over 80 parents of primary students, principals and teachers as well as our parents and students, the forum was informative, entertaining and, at times, emotional as guest speaker, Angie Wilcock, our teachers, parent and students presented to the very receptive audience. I was very proud of our school captains who emceed the morning, Year

7 students who spoke compellingly of their high school experience and our teachers including Ms Goulousis, Year 7 Advisor 2014, who outlined her vision for, and commitment to Year 7 2014.

Congratulations to Ms Iva Slavica and her team of teachers and students who collectively ensured the success of this year's '**Top of the Hill**'. Whilst all our transition programs demonstrate our long-standing and comprehensive commitment to primary students' successful transition to high school, 'Top of the Hill' provides a wonderful centrepiece for this commitment. The visiting primary children benefit from expert and specialist teachers within a high school setting; our students also benefit as they lead and nurture the younger students throughout their two day high school experience.

Of course, these programs are possible because of the strong relationship that Hunters Hill High enjoys with its **Partner Primary Schools**. This term, our neighbouring Primary Principals will attend our Presentation Day. I will be present or represented at each of our Primary Schools' Presentation Days; at each ceremony a Hunters Hill High School Award will be presented.

My thanks to parents who have finalised their **2013 school accounts**; conversely, for those parents who are yet to finalise their 2013 accounts, I urge prompt attention to this matter. In recent weeks, the school has sent out reminders to parents who have overlooked payment. Parent prompt payment assists the school's provision of its curriculum and the wide array of programs which build student leadership, citizenship and student well-being.

Whilst the time and date of the **Year 12 'sign-out'** was communicated to all students and families, Year 12 students' response was poor with only 40% of students meeting this commitment. Again, if you are a parent of a 2013 Year 12 student, please insist that all school resources are returned and organise the finalisation of all school accounts. I appreciate your assistance with this matter.

As **Year 10 students** have many commitments and programs to negotiate this term, the school has written to parents so both students and parents are well-informed. Student attendance is compulsory each day until the conclusion of the Year 10 Special Assembly.

My thanks to parents who have been courageous in their guidance of their children regarding children's **responsibilities to their school community**: a positive commitment to learning and behaviour, including their demeanour in public as they travel to and from school, as well as the school's uniform code. Whilst these responsibilities are stressed at school, it's clear that our students' commitment to positive behaviour and learning reflects their families' values and conversations within their homes. Repeatedly, I receive feedback from the general public as well as members of our school community regarding our students' uniform and behaviour within the wider community. I urge each family to work with the school and insist that there are responsibilities within all communities – within a school community those responsibilities centre upon learning, behaviour and uniform.

The **P&C run Uniform Shop** provides a great service to our families – a one-stop shop for all uniform items except for the **plain black leather shoes** that are required of all students. I appreciate that misinformation about uniform requirements is possible so if you are uncertain about what is and isn't uniform, check out our website or this newsletter. Similarly, if you want to know the operational hours of the Uniform Shop, check out our website or this newsletter!



As the school year draws to a close, I believe it is timely that we are reminded of the crucial role that the **P&C** plays within our school community. Apart from staff and student management which is not the domain of the P&C, there are very few areas of our school community that aren't enhanced by the P&C and its operation. Whilst the P&C meets twice a term, P&C members run the Uniform Shop, coordinate the canteen, band, boys' and girls' dance groups, fundraise, host functions at the start and conclusion of each school year and ensure that our magnificent grounds are well maintained. Due to the strong and respectful leadership of our P&C, the school and the P&C work well together for the benefit of our students.

This month's **P&C Meeting** will be held in the **school library at 7.30pm on Monday, November 18**. Ms Pam Buchanan, HT HSIE and Ms Michelle Chiew, HT Science will present a workshop on the school's preparation, with its strong focus on programming and pedagogy, for the Australian curriculum.

PDHPE FACULTY



On Friday 18th October, 44 Year 10 HHHS students attended the RYDA Road Safety Education day at Sydney Olympic Park.

The aim of the day, organised by the PDHPE department, was to provide our HHHS students with an opportunity to learn essential life skills. Through this program, students are encouraged to take greater responsibility for themselves and

their friends before they face the challenges of driving solo or as a passenger of a new driver.

The day included 6 sessions;

- **Stopping Distances.** Demonstrating the distance it takes to stop a vehicle travelling at different speeds, highlighting the huge impact an extra 10km/h can have. Students had the opportunity to participate, as passengers, in a vehicle driven by a licensed driving instructor.
- **Hazards, Distractions and Risks.** A high energy session familiarising students with common crash types and how to avoid or minimise their impact.
- **Plan B; Alcohol, Drugs and Fatigue.** An interactive workshop focusing on the impact that alcohol, drugs and fatigue have on driving ability.
- **Road Choices.** A discussion, led by a Police Officer, on the consequences of poor choices on the road; from the tragic human toll to financial and legal ramifications.
- **Crash Survivor.** A powerful presentation by a person (Andrew) who had a brain and spinal injury as a result of a motor vehicle crash.
- **My Wheels.** Students learn about vehicle safety, covering topics such as ABS brakes, car maintenance and insurance.



Quotes:

"Today in the RYDA Program, we were used as crash test dummies, going 40km/h and braking rapidly allowing us to feel the full impact of a crash without actually being hurt. We learned the stopping distance and the distance needed to be left between cars. This could really be helpful for when we get our licences, to minimise our risk of a crash or serious injury. I really enjoyed the entire day" – **Dakota**

"I had a really fun time at the RYDA Road Safety Education. There were a wide variety of sessions, aimed at travelling safely and one of them included a 'stopping distance' session. What we did was get in a car travelling at 60km/h and suddenly stopping, seeing how far the car travelled from where it stopped. This session was my personal favourite. It was a new experience" – **Matthew**

"Today was a very beneficial day for myself and others my age. I learnt some road safety that I thought I knew before but it turns out that I didn't. For example how long the 3 second gap is that you have to leave between cars. I knew you had to leave a fair distance but not that much! I got to see the different stopping distances at various speeds and also had a chance to be in a car that slammed on the brakes. These workshops have opened my eyes to how important it is when you're driving to not drink, to be alert and to watch how many people I have in my car. I'm very glad I came" – **Samantha**

"Today, year 10 had the privilege to listen to crash survivor Andrew re-cap his experience of being involved in a car accident. He suffered several injuries to his spine, limbs and worst of all T.B.I. (Traumatic Brain Injury). He spent ten months in hospital then continues to be looked after by family members. He lives his life now as if every day was his last. He left us with a message; "Enjoy all the little things in life and never take them for granted" – **Alex**
