

FACULTY REPORTS

Science

The Science Faculty has progressed in leaps and bounds since the beginning of the year. The need to keep moving with our students' technological skills, it has become of paramount importance. It is important that we interact with, and incorporate technology in our teaching and learning has become paramount.

One of our investments this year has involved the installation of the brand new digital projectors. Having increased our ability to communicate holistically within the classroom, this visual tool has assisted in removing the stigma behind copious amounts of handouts, saved photocopying costs and opened a door to interactive learning as students develop the ability to interpret and analyse information from a visual source.



This tool has also enhanced learning from a practical perspective. Our 2015

Year 12 Senior Science students recently dissected a heart to assist their understanding around its structure and function. With the use of our newest investment, students had the ability to learn from an exemplar heart under the camera, whilst the dissection occurred.

Moving forward, our vision is to create and sustain an interactive classroom environment for our students. This has precipitated our latest investment-Google Chrome Books. This multi-faceted interface will not only create ease of research within the classroom but will also enhance teacher and student interaction through multiple applications. Google Classroom weaves together Google Docs, Drive and Gmail to help teachers create and collect assignments paperlessly. As teachers, we can quickly see who has or hasn't completed the work, and provide direct, real-time feedback to individual students.



As we move towards the common goal of our faculty for a more interactive and engaging classroom, we haven't thrown away the idea of using the old fashioned pen and paper. Whilst we are investing in tools to assist student engagement, we recognise that a variety of different learning strategies should be used to enhance students' ability to think and write critically.

The additional technology, coupled with more traditional learning strategies means a greater emphasis around our literacy and numeracy skills, the ability to interpret qualitative and quantitative data and the ability to scientifically write about it.

With greater emphasis on writing skills, extrapolating questions, creating marking criteria and peer marking, the Science Faculty is working to extend students to achieve at their maximum potential.

Australian Mathematics Competition

Hunters Hill High School has had some fantastic results this year in the Australian Mathematics Competition. Despite the name, it

has become an international event with countries throughout the Pacific and South East Asia participating, and some from even further afield taking part. The aims of the competition are three-fold:

- 1. To highlight the importance of mathematics as a curriculum subject
- 2. To give students an opportunity to discover talent in mathematics
- 3. To provide resources for the classroom and general discussion

Students are asked to solve thirty problems in 75 minutes (Years 7 to 12). The earlier problems are easier with the problems becoming progressively more difficult towards the end, when they are challenging to the most gifted student.





Helping learner drivers become safe drivers





Free workshop for parents and supervisors of learner drivers

An important component of the Graduated Licence Scheme is that all learner drivers under 25 years must complete a minimum of 120 hours supervised on-road driving experience prior to presenting for their provisional P licence.

The RMS (formerly RTA) and Hunters Hill Council are holding a free two hour workshop to offer practical advice to parents and supervisors on how to help learner drivers become safer drivers.

This workshop will provide information about:

- Completing the Learner Driver log book.
- Recent changes to the GLS
- The new RMS SAFER DRIVERS COURSE.
- The current laws and restriction for L and P licence holders.
- Supervising learner drivers and young driver road safety issues.
- The benefits of supervised on-road driving experience.



There is no good reason to bring a knife to school.

NSW now has the toughest knife laws in Australia. As a parent, you need to be aware of these laws, as you can also be charged if you allow your child to carry a knife.

No knives allowed at school under any circumstances.

- If a student has a knife at school the principal may call the police.
- The student may be expelled or suspended immediately.
 Possessing a knife includes your child simply having one in their bag or locker. Having a knife for self-protection is also illegal. If you are concerned about your child's wellbeing or safety, contact the principal.
- Tough penalties apply for children convicted of knife offences, including gaol sentences of up to 25 years if someone is injured with a knife during an assault.

Every child has the right to feel safe and secure at school. There is no good reason for a child to ever have a knife at school.

If you want to talk about children and knives at school, please contact the principal.

What kind of knives are prohibited?

As school policy is designed to keep all students safe, no type of knife is allowed at school. No type of knife is allowed at school. That means no butter knives or fruit knives in lunchboxes, or knife tools for craft purposes.

- Flick knives, ballistic knives, sheath knives, push daggers, trench knives, butterfly knives and star knives are all prohibited.
- Your child cannot bring to school any item that can be used as a weapon (such as a chisel).
- In lessons requiring the use of knives, for example cooking or trades, your child's teacher will supply and supervise the use of the tools.
- There are some senior subjects, such as hospitality, where children may be required to have their own knives.

Your child's school will advise you about these courses and the procedures for carrying knives legally to and from school and TAFE.

The law makes parents responsible

You need to make certain your child is aware of the school's rules and the State laws about knives.

If you allow your child to carry or possess a knife at school or in a public place, you can be charged.

- The police can search any child they suspect of having a knife. They can confiscate any dangerous object they might find during the search.
- Your child must comply with such a police search, or they may be arrested and charged.
- It is also illegal for anyone to sell a knife to anyone who is less than 16 years old.
