Principal's Report

The school is proactively responding to planned HSC changes that have been proposed by the Minister where mandatory minimum standards will need to be achieved by students in literacy and numeracy before the awarding of the HSC in future years.

We are developing and will implement a new module for students whose literacy or numeracy skills require further enhancement in Year 9 in 2017. The school will nominate the participants based upon previously collected literacy and numeracy data. This class will take the place of one of the Year 9 elective lines for the nominated students. Through this strategy, we aim to assist all of our students in meeting these new and emerging HSC requirements.

To our Year 12 students as they are about to leave us, I wish you well in your future endeavours. To all of our student cohort, have a happy and safe Term 3 holiday.

DEPUTY PRINCIPAL REPORT

It was a pleasure to attend the **Year 12 HSC Showcase** on Thursday evening, 1st September. Huge congratulations to all our staff and students who contributed to make this evening an outstanding success.

I'm pleased to announce, following a process of merit selection, Ms Martha Maroon was appointed to the position of **Permanent School Administrative Manager**. Martha has a long and valued history at HHHS. This promotion will see Martha manage our dedicated team of School Administrative Support Officers, as well as running many critical school functions and finance.

Relating to **school infrastructure projects and maintenance**, I can update the community on our most recent activities:

- The **School Hall and Movement Studio** are **now Wi-Fi enabled**. Cabling and WAPS (wireless access points) have been installed in both locations enabling connectivity for 120 devices in the main Hall and 60 in the Movement Studio (\$9,000)
- Extensive work has taken place in the **school carpark**. After preparation, the carpark was resurfaced with asphalt, providing much needed improvements for our visitors and staff. (\$17,500)
- New computer desks have been purchased for the library. These state-of-the-art desks will house the 50 student computers located in the library. (\$9,000)
- The school has contracted 'Techni-Clean' to complete a **major concrete clean** during the October School Holidays. This maintenance will focus on K Block and the Hall surrounds. The main goal of this project is to revitalise the look of concrete surfaces and remove chewing gum. (\$4,000)
- New **classroom blinds** have been installed in several Mathematics rooms in K Block. (\$3,000)
- Substantial tree pruning has occurred to enable the construction of our P&C funded \$56,000 Shade Sail Structure. (\$2,000)

Following on from the above 'project' news, I'd like to remind families that paying their **school contributions** is important in allowing HHHS to provide and improve infrastructure and learning opportunities to all students. If you haven't finalised your financial commitments for 2016, I encourage you to contact our office staff to make arrangements. As always, if financial difficulties make school contributions prohibitive, please contact the school.

Regarding one of the above projects, I'd like to remind all families that **chewing gum is banned** from school. Discarded chewing gum is both unhygienic and unsightly. With the upcoming expenditure on cleaning gum, I'd appreciate parental support in **prohibiting students from bringing gum to school**.

Our major project for Term 4 is the school's change from our self-managed computer network to an eT4L Network Environment. As detailed in previous Figtree newsletters, this change is designed to simplify our network, allowing more cost effective management and remote access, as well as improving connectivity and speed to all staff and students. Further information will be provided in upcoming notifications and newsletters. I've very excited about this huge improvement to our school network. Changeover is scheduled for Day 1 Term 4 - 10th October. The school network will be non-operational all day on both Monday and Tuesday, with gradual releasing of other devices throughout the remainder of the week. We appreciate everyone's patience during Week 1 Term 4. This short-term interruption is required to facilitate our major network improvements.

Achievers Camp is fast approaching - 23rd to 25th November. This year, Achievers Camp will be held at Vision Valley, Arcadia. As always the criteria for Achievers Camp is 'Thinkers, Triers and Doers'. Congratulations to all those students receiving invitations. Please remember to inform the school if you are unable to attend camp, as 2nd round offers can be made.

I wish everyone an enjoyable and safe October School Holidays.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION FOR YEAR 12 STUDENTS AND FAMILIES

By now, all families should have received a letter detailing end of year activities and expectations. This information is also available on the school website and App.

I'd like to remind all students of the following critical information from Ms Felton:

Whilst this time is an emotional one for all HSC candidates, I urge students and their families to maintain focus on the examinations and remember that **end-of-year activities**, such as, "muck-ups" do not have the approval of the school and should not take precedence over students' revision and access to their teachers. **High standards of behaviour must be demonstrated by all Hunters Hill High students at all times**. **Breaches of these standards, anti-social or illegal actions will have immediate and severe consequences**.

The current Year 12 cohort has established themselves as a dynamic and highly valued group of young people. It's important that all Year 12 students complete their secondary schooling in an honourable fashion, which will allow fond reflections throughout the future. Please heed the above information; it would be regrettable for any Year 12 student to jeopardise their HSC progress or tarnish the reputation of their year group.

Please be aware that the **Year 12 Graduation Assembly** will take place in the Phil Daniels Pavilion (School Hall) on **Wednesday 21st September** 2016. **Strict uniform standards apply**. Any student not wearing full school uniform will not be permitted to be recognised on stage receiving their portfolios. A full dress rehearsal for Year 12 will be held in the Theatrette from **9am on Tuesday 20th** September. Attendance in full school uniform is compulsory.

This time of the year is highly critical for Year 12 students. I'm very aware that students can easily lose focus as they see the 'light at the end of the tunnel' or start making 'schoolies' or travel arrangements. I encourage all students to utilise the October school holidays and days prior to the HSC examinations to knuckle down, focus and make all attempts to prepare for the HSC Examinations. Remember that your dedication for the next 3 weeks can make all the difference to your HSC performance. As always, teachers will be offering 'study workshops' and tuition during these 3 weeks; please take-up these opportunities.

Importantly, if any student becomes unwell or experiences any situation that would cause them to miss a HSC exam or inhibit their HSC performance, please ensure you garner a medical certificate on or before the day of any examination and any other supporting documentation. **HSC misadventure appeals** are handled externally. The HHHS HSC Presiding Officer is Ms Louise Morgan. Students wishing to apply for misadventure should contact Louise directly in the School Hall or by phoning school reception. Please remember, any HSC misadventure appeal must be submitted prior to 9th November, or it will not be considered.

Major Changes to School Network - eT4L Migration

eT4L Migration at Hunters Hill High School will take place on **Monday 10th October 2016**, Day 1 Term 4. Hunters Hill High School will be migrating to the Department of Education (DoE) technology management program called **eT4L (Enhanced Technology for Learning)**. It has been developed by DoE to provide schools with a stronger and more flexible, standardised ICT foundation that improves both the school's capacity for self-support and the Department's ability to deliver services.

The benefits of migrating to eT4L are that it gives our school the chance to explore greater learning opportunities in today's digital world. When a school migrates to eT4L, the DER (Digital Education Revolution) wireless setup will be aligned to the eT4L wireless standard and will then provide connectivity for all wireless devices at the school, including DER, discretionary purchase and BYOD devices.

Students will be provided with more information following our migration on 10/10/16. Students and staff will experience a **lack of network connectivity during Week 1 Term 4**. Parents should also be aware that the school will not be able to transmit any information on Monday or Tuesday of Week 1 Term 4 as the entire **network will be off-line**. Gradual re-establishment of our network will occur throughout the week, with the expectation of full network availability on Friday 14th October.

Students will notice the most difference when signing in and storing data. The following posters explain some of the changes as a result of our migration. Please also be aware of the following;

- Any student wishing to keep a copy of any data currently stored within the school network must **remove this by the end of term** Friday 23rd September
- Following migration, students will have access to **5GB of storage on their individual U Drive**. This data will be monitored by the school and the school is not responsible for 'backing up' this data.
- When logging onto devices, students will no longer be required to enter @detnsw following their name. Students will login using their own **portal username and password**.
- Generic computer logons will no longer exist. Students must logon using their own credentials.

Due to these changes, it's critical that students know and use their **Student Portal**. If students have forgotten their student password or username, please see Mr Stewart in the Library or myself for a reset. **Students will not be able to use any device without their portal username and password**.

I encourage all students to utilise their student portal as the primary means for school based email communication, work creation and data storage. All students have access to a **Google Apps** account linked to their portal. I highly recommend that students utilise the cloud storage available in their Google Drive to store data and complete school based tasks.

School success is more than a NAPLAN score

The NSW Secondary Principals' Council (NSW SPC) is the professional body representing Principals of government schools and colleges in NSW that have secondary school enrolments. The Council works closely with senior officials from the NSW Department of Education and the NSW Education Minister and provides advice on matters relating to public secondary education in NSW.

It's time for a more serious discourse about what and how we measure school performance. The NSW SPC believes the focus on standardised testing such as NAPLAN and PISA rankings needs to be repositioned to consider broader definitions of school success. The NSW SPC President, Chris Presland, said investigating how other countries measure school success is crucial to this discussion.

"At the end of 2015 the *Every Student Succeeds Act* became law in the USA and this will be interesting to watch because part of the act requires states to incorporate non-academic factors, such as student engagement and school climate and safety, into their accountability systems. While it is important to recognise that the quality of measurements for these non-cognitive factors is still a developing area, this focus could provide a more nuanced understanding of school success which extends beyond traditional measures such as standardised test scores."

Mr Presland also said that the consistent performance of the Finnish education system in PISA rankings highlights the need for a more holistic understanding of educational success and school performance.

"Finnish children have the lightest homework load of any industrialised nation and shorter school hours than many Australian children, however there is strong value placed on the idea of human capital and a broad understanding of student and school success. We see Finnish schools working to cultivate an environment of innovation whereby student success is about creativity, flexibility and the ability to apply knowledge across a variety of situations. Most importantly these strategies promote an educational environment which prepares young people for an economy where entrepreneurship and innovation are key measures of progress."

While politicians suggest that it is evidence based best practice, rather than funding, that will see students achieve the best results, the NSW SPC maintains it is not an "either or" debate. Both are necessary. Equitable funding is intrinsically linked to international measures of educational success such as access and participation.

"As the Finnish educator and author Pasi Sahiberg explains, strong education performance in the Finnish context means more than high student academic achievement as measured by international comparative assessment studies. In Finland, measuring school success is also about the level of participation in and access to education and the even distribution of learning outcomes throughout different schools and learners", Mr Presland said.

The evidence shows that what really makes a difference to the quality of education is the interaction between high quality teachers, engaged students and a flexible curriculum. Therefore we need to move beyond seeing standardised test scores as the only means of quantifying the educational achievement of Australian students. The fact is that some of our most challenging school communities achieve extraordinary outcomes with their students, but these outcomes are rarely understood or publicly acknowledged by our politicians and general community.

Drawing on the experiences and ideas of our international education colleagues provides a potential starting point for beginning to redefine educational success as more than a NAPLAN score.







Maths Matters

Australian Mathematics Competition (AMC)

The AMC, run by the Australian Mathematics Trust, was held this year on Thursday 27th July. One of the largest annual events on the Australian education calendar, the AMC was the first competition of its kind in Australia and is now one of the largest of its type in the world. More than 40 countries participate each year.



The competition aims to be accessible to all students from Years 3 to 12, not just the mathematically gifted. There was an emphasis on problem solving, a valuable life skill, and the questions were designed to be fun for the student. The AMC consisted of 30 questions in the Junior (Years 7 and 8), Intermediate (Years 9 and 10) and Senior (Years 11 and 12) divisions undertaken within a 75 minute time period.




NUMERACY CENTRE


