### **Principals Report**

The testing times that have existed for the last six months or so seems to be a constant state of flux. Successes being balanced by setbacks. Still it is at times like these you can really appreciate the strength of our community at this school. My ongoing thanks to the vast majority of our parents who have been supportive and understanding throughout the changing educational landscape in 2020. The reality is that schools and society both are unlikely to return to what they were.

A big thank you to the P&C under the inspiring leadership of Jacqueline Crompton. She has picked up where Martin Brown left off and continued the stirling fundraising efforts that have allowed the P&C to provide \$170,000 to support school projects. We now have easily the best resourced technology hub on the north side with industrial quality equipment for students to use and become familiar with. Moreover, the reconstruction of the gym is underway. It will soon be a lot more user friendly and with greater variety.

An especially big thank you too, to Warwick McAlpine and the other staff who have involved themselves in the Duke of Edinburgh program. It hasn't been without its trials and tribulations, but then most things worth having require effort. There is a nice article coming in the Figleaf Student Newsletter that will highlight the efforts of the current group of gold medallion achievers that are the first ever in the history of the school. They have set a great example and we look forward to further cohorts of students being involved in this worthwhile endeavour.

With the current restrictions we cannot have a Year 12 Graduation as we normally would so we have postponed it until immediately after the HSC. Hopefully, by then, we'll be able to have parents on site. Similarly, Mr McAlpine and Ms Chiew-Meldrum are looking to provide suitable ways for Year 12 to be able to mark the end of high school.

As some parents would be aware there is a uniform review under way. Community, student and staff representatives are looking at a range of options at the moment. It is important however that all our parents and students get the opportunity to comment on the possible changes and have some input. To this end, a survey will be sent out to our community. I urge you to take the opportunity to make a thoughtful response when this arrives. Mrs Donovan, Deputy Principal, is co-ordinating this review.

As you may have read in the media there is a new school planning process underway. The school is proceeding with its planning for 2021 to 2024 school plan and will consult with the community though the P&C forum during Term 4. At the moment the P&C is limited to meetings via Google Meet. Not ideal, but this type of meeting has become the new normal it seems.

# **P&C Report**

If I have a theme for this term's Figtree, it is *partnership*: because the depth of partnership and collaboration between the P&C, the school leadership, teachers and students has resulted in some very exciting outcomes this term.

#### \$170,000 Funding Committed for Projects

The P&C has committed \$170,000 to amazing projects proposed by both teachers and students that will be of fantastic benefit to our children. This includes:

- \$77,740 for a second laser cutter and a CNC milling machine;
- \$55,000 for a complete refit of the fitness centre;
- \$22,500 for Stage One of a lighting upgrade to the hall & theatrette;
- \$8,000 for the installation of new bike racks accommodating 40 bikes; and,
- \$5,400 for the purchase of a new digital piano and amp.

It is worth highlighting that the addition of the laser cutter and CNC milling machine will make our TAS department the most technologically advanced public high school in Northern Sydney. The overhaul of the fitness centre will also make HHHS one of the best equipped public high schools for fitness and we expect to see lots of students and staff accessing the centre both in and out of class time. The P&C was also very impressed by the thoughtful pitch made by our student leaders for well-designed and well-positioned bike racks, which our TAS construction students will also have the opportunity to work on.

In partnership, we have raised funds and considered how best to use them. The school community should be proud of its fundraising efforts, and special thanks go to **Suzanne Kimpton**, **Robyn Butterfield** and **Olejuru Lanfear** for leading those efforts most recently.

#### Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme - First Gold Awards for HHHS

Another wonderful and perhaps less well-known partnership between the school and parents is the Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme. **Mr McAlpine** runs the Bronze Duke of Edinburgh Award (starting in Year 9 in normal circumstances) and this is no small undertaking – it includes many hours of admin and student support, as well as supervising students on two arduous overnight hikes.

Students who achieve their Bronze Award can now continue on to the Gold Award under the accredited supervision of an HHHS parent, **Mishele Cavanagh-Downs**. This is a prestigious accreditation that also enables students to seek early university placement though "leadership and achievement" pathways.

For the first time in the school's history, students from HHHS will graduate with the Gold Duke of Edinburgh Award, including **Poppy Burton** (Vice Captain), **Xavier Cavanagh-Downs**, **Charles Crompton**, **Hugo Gentle**, **Alex Manefield** and **Josh Nowiczewski**. These six Year 12 students are our inaugural Gold Award recipients after completing the 18-month Gold Award program, and Poppy Burton is the first female student at HHHS to even attempt the Gold Award. Congratulations!

The P&C is very grateful to the school (and to Mr McAlpine in particular) for providing this opportunity, and we are very grateful to Mishele Cavangh-Downs for enabling students to continue their journey through to the Gold Award. Even though Mishele's family leaves HHHS at the end of this year, she will continue to volunteer on behalf of the P&C as a Gold Award Supervisor for HHHS students.

The P&C will arrange an online meeting early in Term 4 for eligible students interested in undertaking the Gold Award in 2021, where parents and students currently completing their Bronze Award can meet with Mishele and understand both the commitments and advantages of the Gold Award. We look forward to seeing more students achieving this prestigious award, and supporting a culture of achievement at HHHS.

#### **Covid Safety**

Finally, it is with heavy hearts that the P&C has suspended band and choir activities again this Term, in line with newly released NSW Covid safety rules. Again, the P&C commits to working in strong partnership with the school to ensure compliance with rules, communication of guidelines and recommendations, and above all, the safety of our students and all the staff who make their education both positive and possible.

### **Wellbeing Report**

During Term 3 Staff Development Day, Hunters Hill High School staff participated in a wellbeing session with our local Headspace branch. Throughout the session we were provided with some healthy reminders about self-care strategies and how to develop a self-care plan. These strategies are not only important to staff wellbeing, but are essential when enabling staff to model similar strategies to our students. By demonstrating to students how we can be resilient, we hope to empower our young people with the same skills of tolerance, perseverance and grit.

**UMatter Sessions:** Our students continue to develop their interpersonal and intrapersonal skills in problem solving, resilience and self-awareness through regular UMatter sessions. This term we have also taken time to reflect on the Semester 1 reports and identify potential areas of improvement. Our UMatter groups are also becoming quite competitive as they aim to solve the UMatter riddle each Year Meeting!

**Tell Them From Me:** This term our school will be participating in the *Partners in Learning* parent survey, another part of the *Tell Them From Me* suite of surveys (student, teacher and parent surveys) on student engagement. The survey asks parents and carers questions about different factors that are known to impact on student wellbeing and engagement.

Running this survey will help our school understand parents' and carers' perspectives on their child's experience at school. These include: communication between parents/carers and staff, activities and practices at home and parent/carer views on the school's support of learning and behaviour. This valuable feedback will help our school make practical improvements.

**The Wellbeing Hub:** The Hunters Hill High School Wellbeing Hub is an online platform which allows students, parents and carers to access wellbeing resources, quick links, fun facts and mindful activities, whether they are at school or at home.

This is also where you will find information regarding Subject Selections, including Subject Selection Books, for students in Year 8 into Year 9 the following year and Year 10 into Year 11 the following year.



Due to the COVID shutdown, our contact with our external coaches has been somewhat limited at the beginning of the program. We used Google Classroom to keep in contact and share content to support each other, and gathered in small year groups to talk about what was happening in our lives.

On our return to school, we had the opportunity to meet our coaches, Paul and Afaf. We quickly built strong relationships as a group across grades, and began to share about some of our struggles at school. We realised, that a lot of us struggle with the same things. Focus in class, relationships with friends and teachers; self-awareness, and dealing with conflict.

Our sessions have given us time and space to develop our sense of self; awareness of responsibility in relationships, and better management strategies when in conflict.

These lessons have been put into practice in real life, and we have come back to school more successful than ever. Almost perfect uniform, improving attendance, better performance in the classroom, and more peaceful friendships and relationships.

# Ready, Set, Sail!

Sometimes it's good to be scared. Sometimes it's valuable to be uncertain or apprehensive, excited or nervous. On Thursday mornings, when the students involved in the Ready, Set, Sail! resilience program wake up, sometimes they feel these emotions. Perhaps for the only time that week.

Sailing is hard; it is also exhilarating, joyful and occasionally scary. Similarly being great at high school is hard, and at its best, is also exhilarating, joyful and occasionally scary. It is this similarity, and the precious scarcity of big visceral emotions like fear, excitement, desperation which the Ready, Set, Sail! program is built on.

Stimulated by the energetic and eccentric thinking of our Principal Greg Lill, and the passionate encouragement of the Hunters Hill High School Sailing Club President Chris Stannage, in 2020 we launched the sailing and resilience program. Every Thursday morning twelve students from Years 9 and 10 join Mr Neild on the Sydney Harbour learning to sail RS Quest sailing boats. Often they fly, occasionally they flounder, and every now and then they make a mistake and find themselves clambering around an upturned boat with salt water in their face. I can personally attest to the confronting nature of this experience.


The truth that we are chasing out there at the end of a sheet, under the flapping of a sail, is that the only way to achieve success, as a sailor, student or family member is to make enough of the right mistakes.

Following an hour or two of sailing we spend time in the clubhouse writing and sharing our thoughts on that truth. Using the nine key concepts found in the 4C's Pedagogy Learning Disposition Wheel, we reflect on our necessary mistakes, sensational triumphs and attempt to extrapolate the whole process to our efforts as students, athletes and members of the community.

We have much to be proud of and grateful for at Hunters Hill High School this year. Certainly the new Ready, Set, Sail! resilience program should be one. I hope as you read this there is something in your world that is a little bit frightening, and maybe even there are a few important mistakes for you to go and learn from.
