Message from Welfare

We extend a kind welcome to all students, staff and parents to Hunters Hill High School in 2021. Whilst our resolve and patience has been tested of late due to global concerns, our young students are demonstrating resilience and determination in the face of these challenges. In 2021 our Wellbeing initiatives continue to grow and develop, ensuing that our students understand that they are known, valued and cared for.

UMatter and Year Meetings

UMatter continues into its third year and we have seen an improvement in student engagement. Our UMatter lessons allow students to role-play situations in order to develop their sense of belonging, purpose and future. Our regular Year Meetings are also a wonderful opportunity for the cohorts to develop their group's sense of togetherness.

Merit System

In 2021, our school Merit System has further refined to allow students to track their merit achievements via the Student Portal. Merits are issued by teachers based on demonstrated attributes on the Learning Disposition Wheel (Cognitive, Interpersonal, and Intrapersonal) which students are familiar with through their UMatter sessions. This positive based learning tool seeks to reward students when they make personal development, and allows them to reflect on these achievements with their teachers and mentors.

Uniform

A sense of belonging is achieved through developing strong connections and at Hunters Hill High School we are demonstrating this cohesion through ensuring pride in our uniform. We have been proud that students have been wearing the correct uniform consistently and upholding the schools' values. The school has also acquired a collection of second-hand uniforms to provide to students should they arrive in non-uniformed clothing.

Backflips Against Bullying incursion

Students in Years 7 and 8 will attend Backflips Against Bullying in Term 1, an interactive performance where the actors utilised incredible acrobatic and parkour skills to spotlight important issues such as peer harassment and its consequences in the real world. These messages of empathy and tolerance are in alignment with our Wellbeing Framework and reiterate the values of our school community.

Living Room - Library

Our Wellbeing space (the Living Room) has relocated to the mezzanine level in the Library. This space is open to all students during lunchtime, except Tuesday when it is open at recess. Students are invited to play board games or puzzles, or simply chat to one of the Wellbeing Team members available.

Psychologist referrals

We are fortunate to have school psychologists available Monday to Friday to support our students. The Welfare team may refer students if they have concerns about their wellbeing. Students can also self-refer. However, as the counsellors may be meeting with another student, they must take a coloured note and write their name, year group, date, time, and slip it under the door. When an appointment becomes available, the student will called for discreetly from class. If the matter is urgent, students are encouraged to see their Year Adviser, Deputy Principal or UMatter teacher immediately to seek advice.

We look forward to another productive year and encourage all students to continue to strive for their best.

Year 12 HSC Learning Conference

The Year 12 cohort participated in the inaugural HSC Learning Conference on Friday 26 February 2021. The aim of the day was to provide students with a comprehensive approach to managing their HSC year, providing them with some skills that they can use in the future.

Each student was interviewed by a selection of teachers to develop a HSC Success Plan, which looked at identifying the barriers to success for individuals. Data analysed across the year group will enable us to implement targeted interventions in U Matter sessions. The interviews allowed the student to be mindful about their learning journey, focusing on the changes they have made between Year 10 and Year 11 and identifying potential behaviour or routines that need to shift in order for them to be successful in their HSC year.

The other activities were a nice balance between academic and mindfulness outcomes for students, reinforcing the importance of adopting a holistic approach to their education. The activities ranged from a challenging circuit in the new Fitness and Movement Laboratory, a team building group activity, sessions on careers with either a University focus or an apprenticeship and trade focus, and a session on using mindfulness to manage stress.

The day enabled students to collect happy memories in their final year of high school, engaging positively with the school community which is vital for their ongoing success.

Feedback from the Year 12 students was that the day was: Fun, useful, enjoyable, a stress relief, informative and encouraged collaboration in a positive way.

This day could not have been possible without the teachers involved and the inspiring guidance of Deputy Principal Mrs Donovan. My thanks to them for their support of the Year 12 cohort,



School Travel Term 1 2021 - A message from Transport for NSW



Transport for NSW reminds parents to please plan ahead and make sure your child has a valid ticket to travel; either a School Opal card or Child/Youth Opal card (within Greater Sydney) or a School Travel Pass (outside Greater Sydney), from the start of the school year.

The School Student Transport Scheme (SSTS) portal is open all year round, right through Christmas holidays, so parents are able to apply (https://apps.transport.nsw.gov.au/ssts/#/) details at any time in case they change school or move address. Just the same as schools expect students to have their backpack and uniform on day one, we would hope that students have a valid ticket to travel to and from school from the start of the year also.

The vast majority of students using the Opal network will not need a new Opal card and can continue travel on their existing card each year.

The start of the year is a difficult period for local bus operators, and students travelling without a valid ticket makes service planning increasingly difficult for these companies.

We recognise that for some families, last minute changes to school enrolments mean they may not have a School Opal card or Travel Pass for the start of term. In the Opal network, we strongly encourage these families to have their children travel on a Child/Youth Opal card until they receive their valid School Opal card.

Please be assured, bus operators do show discretion to school students, particularly at the start of the school year, and will ensure students can travel safely to and from school. However, we do want to support our operators in encouraging all students to have a valid ticket, as early as possible, from the start of the school year.

HHHS Fitness and Movement Centre GRAND OPENING!!

The P&C and school staff are proud and excited to "officially open" the HHHS Fitness & Movement Centre - because HHHS now has the best gym of any public school in NSW. Kudos and thanks to Mr Leif Smith, Head Teacher PDHPE, for envisaging and delivering this amazing \$82,000 facility, which included a \$55,000 contribution by the P&C.

All new machines, equipment, flooring, mirrors and a sensor-activated water fountain make this a truly professional fitness space that caters to all staff and students - without monthly fees! (Mr Smith also personally framed and erected the exercise posters, which include QR codes for students to access on their phones as they work out.)

In addition to class activities, Mr Smith will publish a detailed timetable for students to access the Fitness Centre outside class time under teacher supervision, in stage groups, and/or times for boys or girls to work out separately. We hope the students make the most of this incredible facility and the P&C is looking forward to investing in more resources and opportunities for our students this year.

Careers News Term 1, 2021

Year 10: Fortnightly careers classes have begun! Students have the opportunity to explore career tools and resources and get to know their Careers Advisors. Several students have engaged in the TAFE YES program, and more will have the opportunity throughout the year.

We are creating a bank of employers to help our students get a foot in the door, and it would be great to have contacts across a variety of industries.

Year 11: TVET has begun for several students. If your child missed their chance to engage in TVET, have them talk to Careers about their options.

Don't forget that year 11 is only three terms long! Use this time to find leadership opportunities, engage in extracurricular activities, and build that resume! This will all help when it comes time to write those early entry applications for university.

Year 12: The Guest Speaker series at HHHS is starting soon, ready to set our year 12s on their best path! Students are encouraged to keep an eye on their student emails and year group Google classroom for details. A variety of universities and other organisations will attend fortnightly sessions.

It's not long now until Year 12 can begin their university applications. UAC logins and PINs will be emailed to students in March, with applications opening April 1st. Once students have paid for their application, they are able to change their preferences as many times as they like at no further cost, and I encourage students to do this sooner rather than later.

If you haven't already, I strongly encourage you to join your student's closed year group on Facebook. I often use these to communicate about any upcoming events or opportunities.

Mr Miles, the Deputy Head, basically ran the whole show. He was a very competent leader and went on to Dulwich Hill High School, a very big change in demographics. I remember him saying at one of our reunions, that he encouraged the boys at Dulwich Hill High School to do activities with which they were familiar with, one being playing cards. However, soon the parents were aghast, as the boys started to 'bet'."

"At HHHS I was quite a bit younger than my peers. Thankfully I didn't get into too much mischief."


"I think HHHS was quite innovative for the times. I can't remember in which year, but for 12 months, the boys could attend cooking classes and I did woodwork".
















The Hunters Hill Council Youth Summit: Nurturing Bright Ideas (Media Release)



Youth-led projects across areas ranging from environmental sustainability to mental health and community place making will be delivered across Hunters Hill following the staging of the 2021 Youth Summit.

Students from Hunters Hill High School, Riverside Girls High School and St Joseph's College convened at Town Hall today (Friday 19 February 2021) for the second annual summit.

Students, with support from Hunter's Hill Council staff, community leaders and teachers, were challenged to design a creative, feasible and impactful project to address issues we face as a community.

Working in small groups the students answered the challenge, with bright ideas on how to improve the experience of living and studying in Hunters Hill.


Concepts pitched included ideas for cleaning and managing the future sustainability of waterways, a community garden and using native stingless bee habitats to improve the health of local ecosystems.

Reducing waste and increasing recycling, and promoting energy efficiency in schools was explored.


